"Fly for the fun of it". — Amelia Earhart

In celebration of Women's history month, we pay tribute to the fearless women who helped shape aviation as we know it and the organization many of them founded that continues to grow and thrive, the Ninety-Nines.

The Ninety-Nines is the largest international organization consisting of thousands of women pilots from 44 countries who's mission is to promote advancement of aviation through education, scholarships and mutual support while honoring a unique history and sharing the passion for flight. Established in 1929, the members of The Ninety-Nines, International Organization of Women Pilots are represented in all areas of aviation today.

The organization was founded November 2, 1929, at Curtiss Field, Valley Stream, Long Island, New York. Amelia Earhart had called for a meeting of female pilots following the Women's Air Derby. As one would expect, they struggled to establish themselves but failure is rarely accepted by determined women. In 1931, Earhart was elected the first President, and the group officially selected the name "Ninety-Nines" to represent the 99 charter members. Membership was immediately opened to other women as they became licensed pilots. In recent years membership has been opened to include women with student pilot certificates.

The groups founding mission continues today with local chapters, museums, endowment funds, education and scholarship programs, most notably the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarships for Women Pilots. The Ninety-Nines established the Fund in 1940 to honor her memory and perpetuate her ideals and love of flying. From a single scholarship of \$125 in 1941, the annual Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund has grown to help over 400 women from six countries to advance and succeed in aviation and aerospace. The amount awarded for these scholarships, including Research Scholar Grants and Fly Now Awards exceeds \$11 Million.
